




<p>1939 German troops invade Poland as Hitler views Polish people as inferior and wanted German to have their land This sets WWII in motion</p>	<p>allies Countries formally cooperating with each other (UK, USA, Russia and France)</p>	<p>I know it took three attempts for the Romans to successfully invade Britain</p>
<p>1940 The Battle of France begins In just over 6 weeks, German forces overrun Belgium and Netherlands, and force surrender of French Government</p>	<p>atomic bomb A weapon that causes mass destruction with its explosive output</p>	<p>I know when both Julius Caesar and Emperor Claudius invaded Britain</p>
<p>1940 The Battle of Britain begins Germany starts by targeting coastal targets, before moving inland to target airfields and communication centres</p>	<p>axis A coalition of countries (Germany, Italy and Japan) that opposed the Allies</p>	<p>I know how and why the Celts resisted Roman rule</p>
<p>1941 Germany invades the USSR</p>	<p>evacuation Moving people from a dangerous place to somewhere more safe</p>	<p>I know what legacy the Romans left behind and can use sources to explore this</p>
<p>1943 The Dambusters bombing raid is carried out against Germany in an effort to disrupt war effort by attacking water supply with 'bouncing bomb'</p>	<p>Nazi Party A radical far-right movement and political party led by Adolf Hitler</p>	<p>What should I already know?</p>
<p>1945 Adolf Hitler marries his partner, Eva Braun The following day they both commit suicide</p>	<p>persecution Ill-treatment on the basis of ethnicity, religion, sexual orientation or political beliefs</p>	<p>A range of people have lived in Britain in the past and had their own way of living</p>
<p>1945 The USA drops atomic bombs on two cities in Japan, Hiroshima and Nagasaki</p>	<p>rationing Controlled distribution of scarce resources</p>	<p>Rulers in the past would often try to take over new lands to increase their power</p>
<p>1945 As the Soviets approach from the east and the UK, USA and France approach from the west, Germany has little choice but to surrender to the Allies</p>	<p>air-raid An attack where bombs were dropped from aircrafts</p>	<p>Julius Caesar had links to pharaoh Cleopatra in Ancient Egypt</p>
<p>1944 Allied invasion of Normandy - this is often referred to as D-Day This is the largest seaborne invasion in history</p>	<p>blackout A period where all lights must be out to avoid being seen by enemies during an air-raid</p>	<p>WWII AXIS & ALLIES</p> 
<p>1941 Japan bombs Pearl Harbour in the USA, decimating US Pacific fleet This is applauded by Hitler, and spurs more Americans to join the war effort</p>	<p>Blitz An intensive or sudden military attack</p>	 
<p>1940 Allied forces are evacuated from Dunkirk in France</p>	<p>fascism A political system with a powerful leader, state control, national pride and no opposition</p>	<p>Information (often biased or misleading) used to promote a political cause</p>
<p>1940 The Blitz - a German bombing campaign - begins against the UK</p>	<p>propaganda Information (often biased or misleading) used to promote a political cause</p>	<p>Deliberate killing of a large number of people from a particular nation or ethnic group</p>
<p>1933 Adolf Hitler is appointed German Chancellor and Nazi party now in control</p>	<p>genocide Deliberate killing of a large number of people from a particular nation or ethnic group</p>	<p></p>

<p>1486 "Malleus Maleficarum" published Rise in witchcraft accusations and trials</p>	Parliamentary act	A law that is made in parliament and agreed will make lives better and is enforceable in all four countries of the UK	I know that in the past, witchcraft was considered a crime punishable by death
<p>1542 Witchcraft Act made witchcraft a secular crime punishable by death Repealed in 1547</p>	repealed	No longer in effect or being used	I know how people were put on trial and 'proved' to be guilty of witchcraft
<p>1563 Second Witchcraft Act replaces the previously repealed act Witchcraft again punishable by death</p>	reinstated	Placed into action again, used again	I know that people in the North East were accused and punished for being witches
<p>1584 "Discoverie of Witchcraft" published by Reginald Scot It expressed skepticism of witchcraft</p>	consorting	To spend a lot of time in the company of someone that isn't well thought of	I know some of the reasons that people were accused of practising witchcraft
<p>1597 King James I published "Daemonologie" to advise on identifying, prosecuting and protecting against witchcraft</p>	devil	Personification of evil	<p>What should I already know?</p> <p>Women in the past did not have the same rights as men</p>
<p>1604 King James I expands on the list of punishable offenses linked to witchcraft</p>	witch	Someone who is thought to have evil or 'magic' powers	
<p>1612 Pendle Witch Trials take place in Lancaster</p>	torture	Where someone inflicts severe mental or physical pain on somebody else intentionally	People used a range of herbal medicines in the past to heal sickness and injuries
<p>1618 Handbook published to aid English judges in pursuing witches</p>	fake	Not genuine or real	People in the past were judged for being different from those around them
<p>1644 Matthew Hopkins is the Witch Finder General In three years, he is responsible for the deaths of approximately 300 'witches'</p>	executed	Put to death intentionally, as a punishment	Some crimes could see the guilty person put to death
<p>1650 30 people accused of witchcraft in Newcastle 27 found guilty and executed</p>	connections	Relating two or more things, feelings, actions or beliefs to each other and finding similarities	Christianity was widespread throughout the United Kingdom
<p>1682 Last documented hangings of witches in England</p>	contrasts	Comparing two or more things, feelings actions or beliefs and finding differences	
<p>1692 Salem Witch Trials take place in British colony of Massachusetts</p>			
<p>1717 Last witch trial in England Defendant is acquitted</p>			
<p>1736 English Witchcraft Act is repealed Formal ending to the witch hunts and trials in England</p>
